NAIDOC WEEK 2020

Kooringal High School acknowledges and pays respect to the Wiradjuri people as we meet on Wiradjuri land, on the sacred hills of Kooringal. We would like to acknowledge all First Nation people as they send an invitation for all to care, value and respect land, water and history. In honour of First Nation people, we pay respect to all Elders, past, present and emerging. We stand with everyone, moving forward with inclusion, support and recognition.

This year's theme "Always Was, Always Will Be."

This year, we had to do things differently but that didn't stop the celebration at our school. Staff and Students hit the mark by paying respect to the First Nation people of Australia.

The week started with an opening dance for one of our primary partner schools (Lake Albert Public School) with Jacob, Joseph, Jade and Cody dancing with chorographer Molly Lenon.

Next, came our big event of showcasing culture through song, dance and what it means to be part of NAIDOC. This film was produced by students and staff, with our proud Aboriginal students directing, filming, speaking and being enthusiastic to represent culture through the entire production of this film. Wednesday the 11th was Remembrance Day and we first paid tribute to all soldiers. Jack Lyons shared a powerful and touching story that involved his Great Grandfather. To all Australian service men and women who serve this country, we remember everyone including the Aboriginal soldiers who were heroes as well.

The film also showcased our Aboriginal Students dancing with the guidance of Molly Lenon as well as a song cover of "Feel the Fire," performed by Gus Belling and Chloe Miles. SCIENCE NEWS

What'll Happen to the Wattle

Our year 9 selective class, have been putting their cross-curricular skills to the test. With a witty, well-crafted short video and a successful, succinct persuasive 200 word application, these students have won an opportunity for KHS to try and grow some of the most famous wattle seeds in history through the "What'll happen to the wattle" project.

What's so special about these seeds? Nothing... yet, but next month, through the One Giant Leap foundation in partnership with the Australian and Japanese Space Agencies, these seeds will be going where no wattle seeds have gone before: The International Space Station!

After 6 months of hanging in microgravity, the seeds will be back to Earth and out to schools and other community organisations to be grown alongside their land-locked counterparts, to investigate the effect of prolonged periods in space on the germination and growth of these iconic Aussie plants. An important step in investigating if we will be able to grow terrestrial plants on Mars. Keep a lookout for our updates as we keep you posted on their progress!



National Indigenous Science Education Program (NISEP)

During week 3, seven Year 9 students took part in the National Indigenous Science Education Program (NISEP), student leader training and hosted chemistry and physics based science events to their peers in Year 9. The events included the racing horse, mobius strip, what's that smell and dry ice experiments. NISEP uses science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) to place Indigenous secondary students in leadership roles at school, in the community and at university-based events, so they can gain the confidence, motivation and aspiration to finish school and pursue pathways to tertiary education and employment.
